MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

Transitioning into 2021, we as a department and as a community continued to navigate our way through COVID-19. Through hard work and dedication, CFPD was able to maintain our high level of service to the community as we worked our way through staffing shortages due to exposure to the pandemic.

Recruitment of new police officers and retaining our existing officers is a serious and growing issue. Locally and nationally we have fewer and fewer people going into the field. During our hiring processes, our applicant numbers are down dramatically. We refuse to lower our standards, which makes finding the right new officers for Chippewa Falls an increasingly difficult task.

One of the biggest triumphs of 2021 was the addition of a School Resource Officer to the Middle School. This had been a goal of both the police department and the Chippewa Falls Area Unified School District for many years. We are pleased that it has come to fruition.

Coming out of the pandemic we were very happy to bring back National Night Out to Chippewa Falls and our surrounding community. This was a massively attended event bringing kids, parents and police together in a positive way.

One big goal in 2021 was catching up on training. A lot of in-person training was canceled last year and many topics in law enforcement cannot be learned remotely. We sent officers to 40 different training sessions covering a wide variety of topics including Leadership, Crime Scene Operations, Street Survival, Peer Support, Radar/Laser, and many more. We will continue this trend in the coming years. With a young department, it is critical that we have well-trained officers ready to handle any call or any investigation they are sent to.

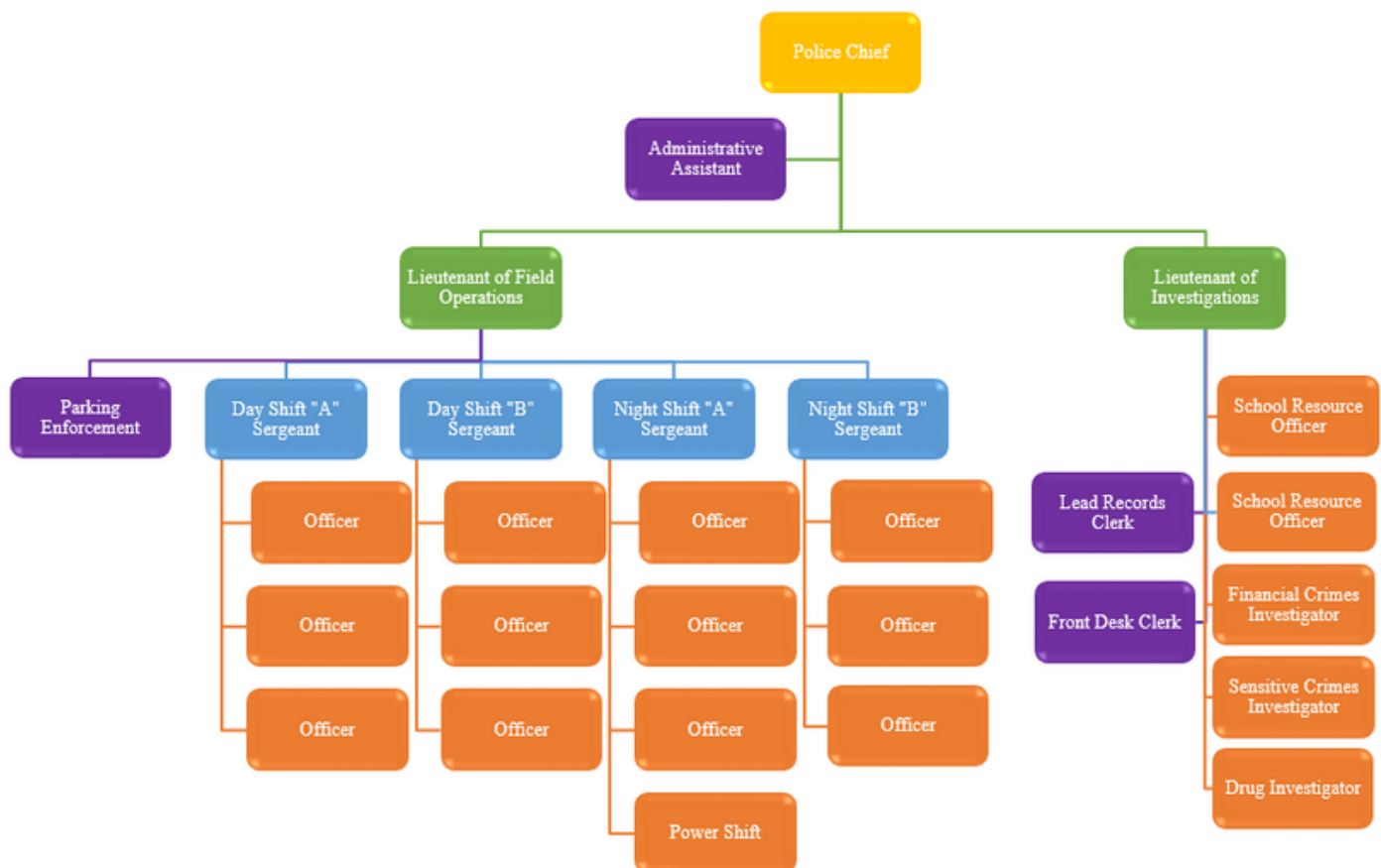
We are one of the first departments in the area to switch to the hybrid engine in our squads this year and we have seen our gas mileage double as a result with no reduction in capability. We were also able to add solar-powered speed signs to the city bringing the total up to four.

We are looking forward to 2022 and the return of many of the special events and in-person connections that make our community a pleasure to live and work in.

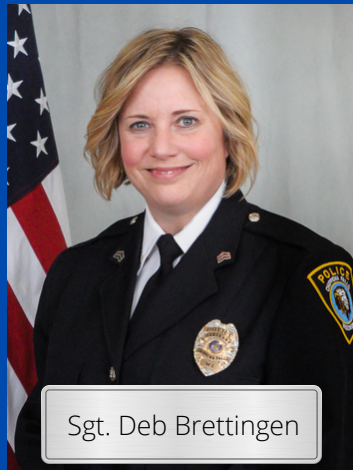

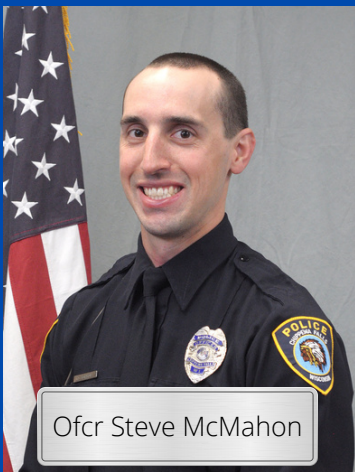

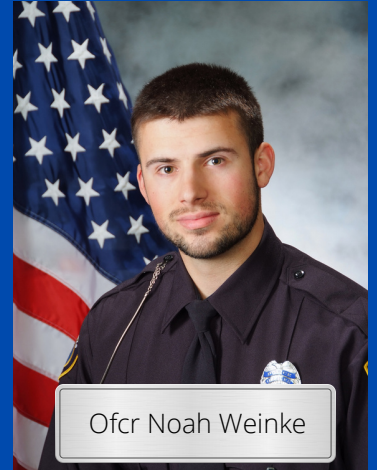

We want to say a big thank you to the employees at **Kwik Trip** on Woodward Ave in Chippewa Falls for doing the right thing.

Last week Monday a lady came into the Kwik Trip and attempted to buy a large amount of Apple gift cards. Store staff was concerned by this and contacted the CFPD. Officer Schoenwetter spoke with the lady and she explained she was told she had warrants for her arrest from South Carolina. She was also told that a vehicle belonging to her had been located with 20 pounds of cocaine.

After speaking with her, our officer assured her she was not in trouble and that it was a scam. Thankfully, she had not provided any compromising information or money and was directed to block the incoming phone numbers.

Without the staff from Kwik Trip recognizing this and taking quick action, this lady could have been out hundreds or even thousands of dollars. Thank you!

If you think you might be the victim of a fraud or are offered something too good to be true, just ask a friend, neighbor, police officer or someone from the bank. Chances are if you run the situation by them, they will help you recognize it as a scam.

No one legitimately from the government is going to ever ask you to pay for a fine or anything else with a gift card. No one is going to legitimately accidentally pay you way too much for something and then ask you to refund them with a gift card. No one is going to award you a prize and then ask you for money to help them get the prize money to you.

The ways people try to run scams are many and everchanging. Be on your guard and ask someone if it doesn't feel right.

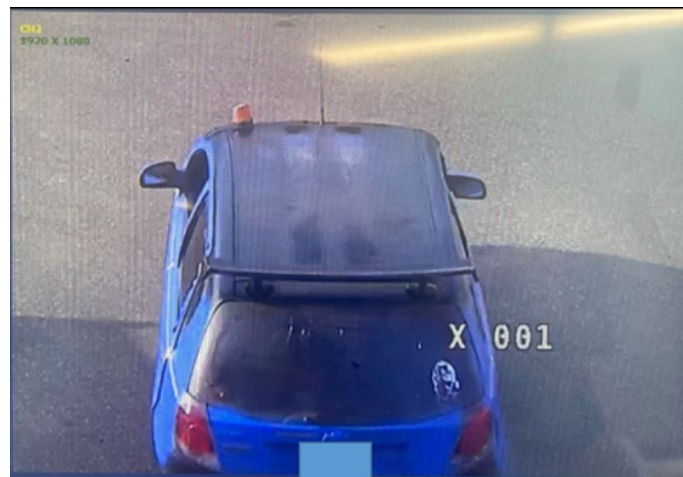
You may or may not be aware of the high level of catalytic converter thefts that have occurred throughout the area this year. Our officers recently took another complaint regarding a catalytic converter theft.

There is no longer any danger to the public.

Assistance needed

Update - Suspect associated with the vehicle has been described as a large and tall white male approximately 30 years of age with brown hair.

Update - All three instances that we are aware of occurred between 11:00am and noon. The locations have been near Monkey Business on the north side of town, in the 500 block of W. Central and in the parking lot at the Kwik Trip on E. Grand Ave.

Each time the male followed a female and during two of the instances attempted to force her out of her car. He was not successful.

We are actively looking for a 2014 Black, Volkswagen Jetta with no plates. The vehicle also has a slightly discolored front bumper.

This vehicle has been involved in three reported incidents of suspected attempted abductions of adult females in the area. Adults females reporting this so far have been around high teens to low 20's in age.

The investigation is active and it appears there may be a danger to the public at this time.

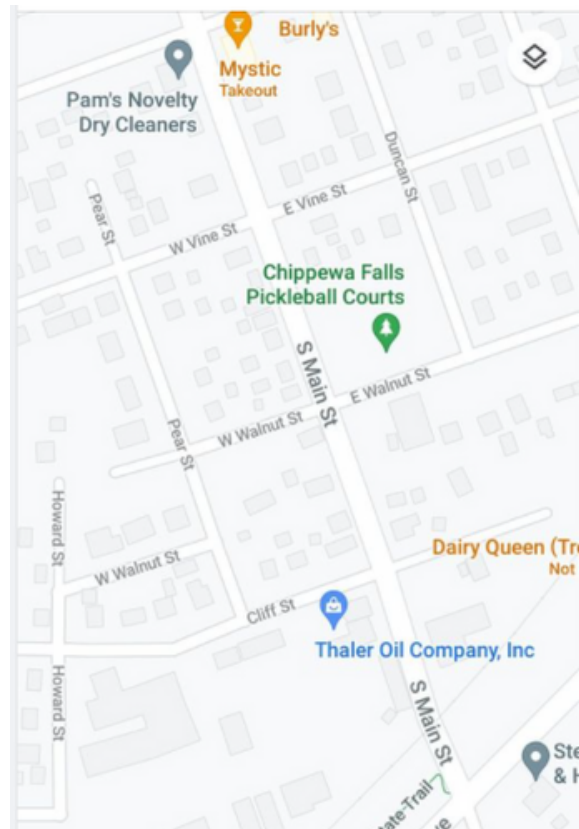

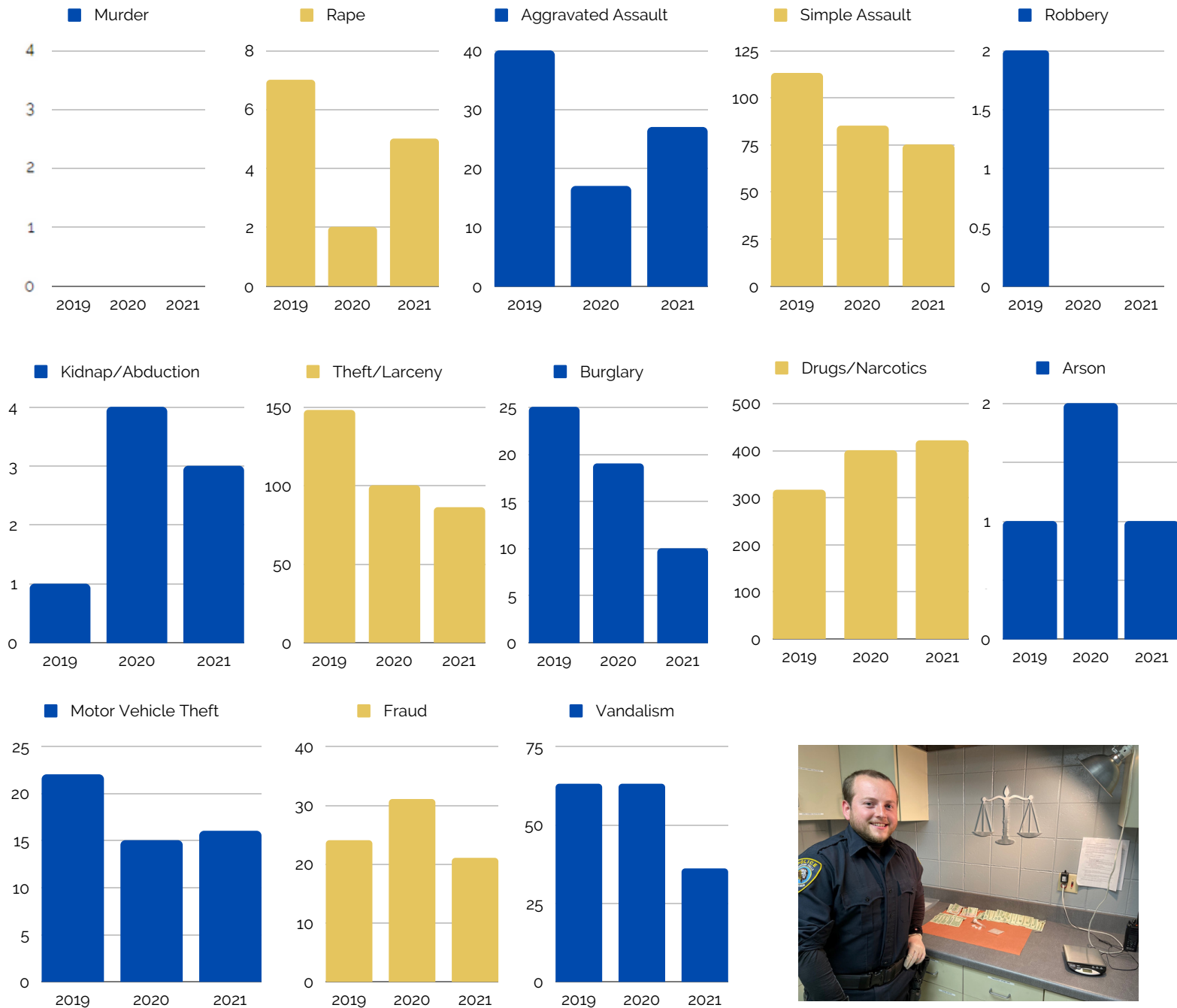
IN-HOUSE TRAINING

USE OF FORCE

The use of force by law enforcement personnel is a matter of critical concern, both to the public and to the law enforcement community. Officers are involved on a daily basis in numerous and varied interactions and, when warranted, may use reasonable force in carrying out their duties. The Chippewa Falls Police Department recognizes and respects the value of all human life and dignity without prejudice to anyone. Vesting officers with the authority to use reasonable force and to protect the public welfare requires monitoring, evaluation, and a careful balancing of all interests.

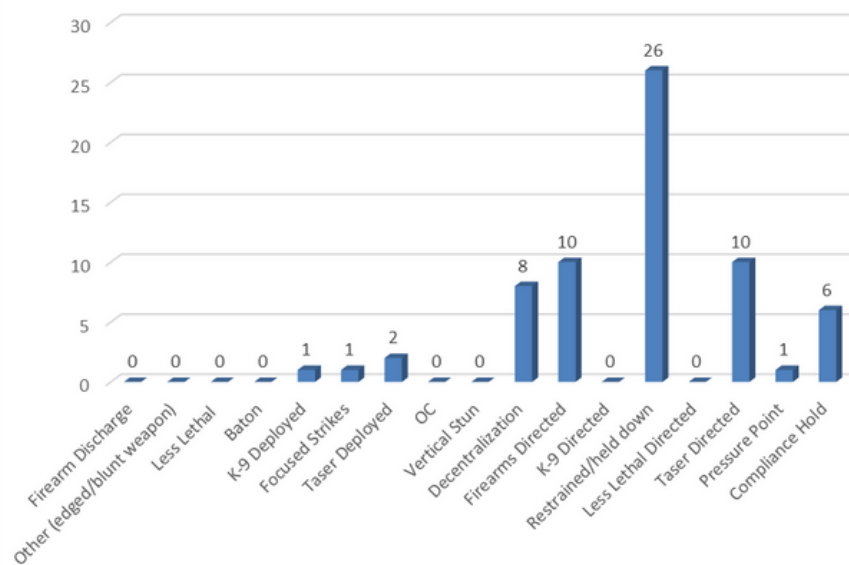
Total Calls for Service in 2021

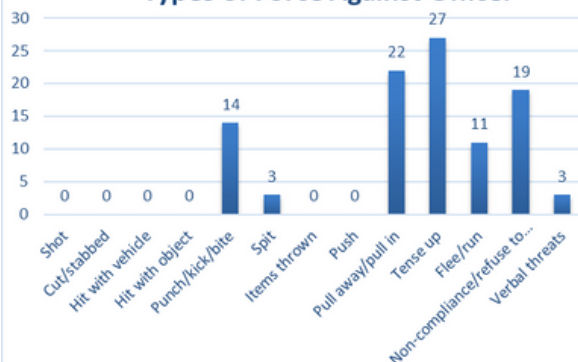
Types of Force used by Officer



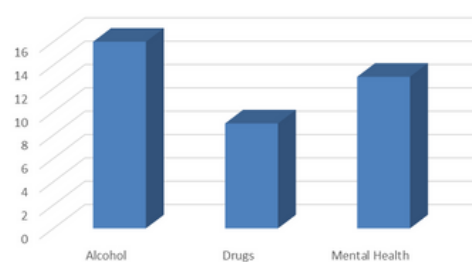
USE OF FORCE

Types of Force Against Officer



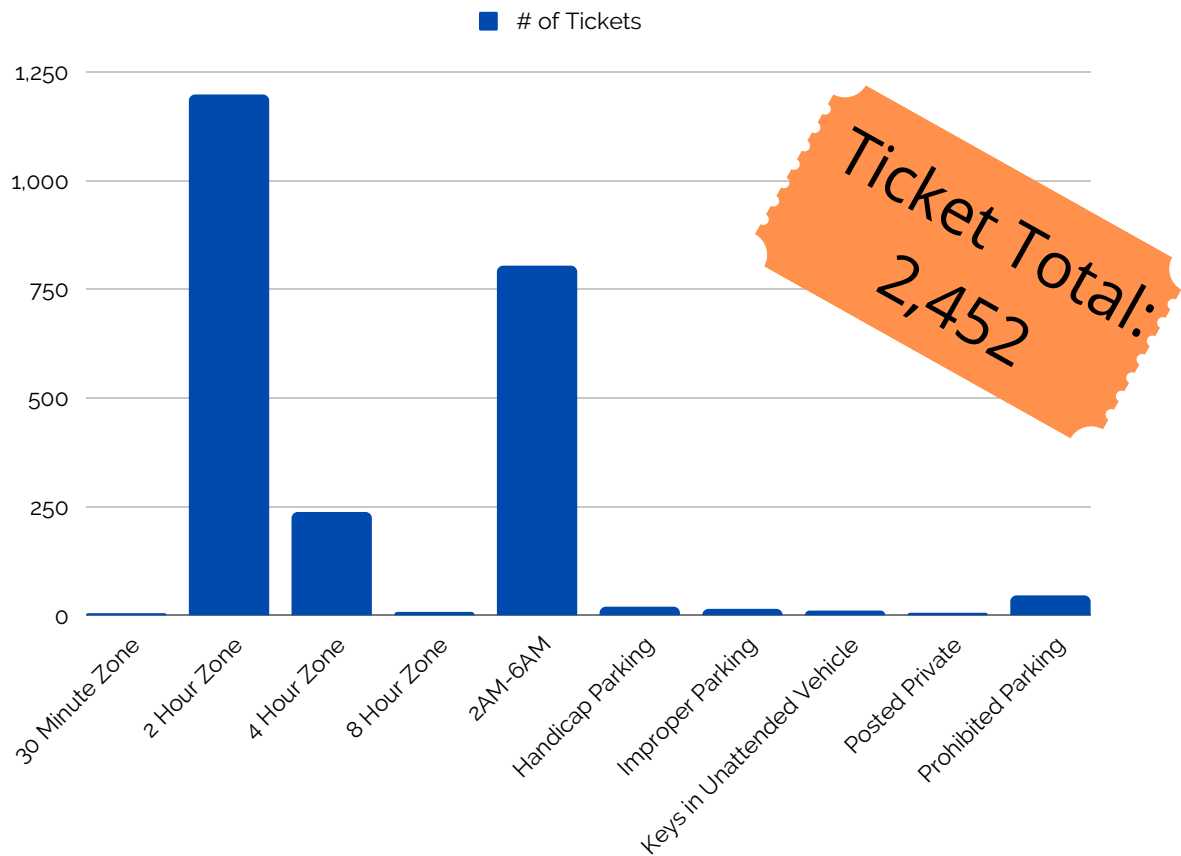
Contributing Factors

PARKING

The last thing you want at the end of your day is a parking ticket! We get it, but parking enforcement is important. It allows for crews to plow our roads in the winter and clean them in the summer. It allows for easy access to downtown businesses. The task of monitoring our streets is generally handled by our Parking Enforcement Officer and sometimes by our Patrol Officers.

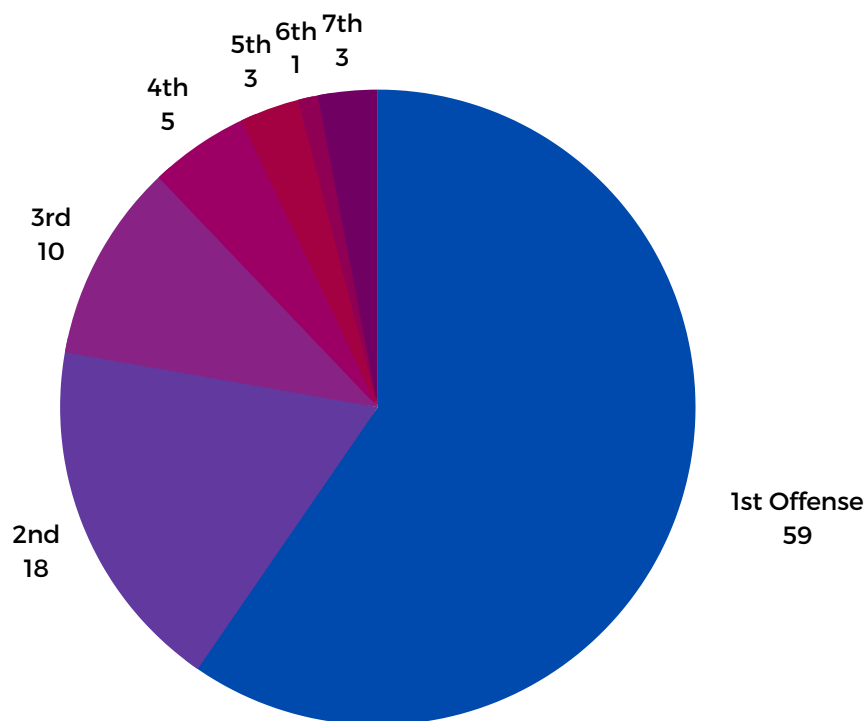


OWI

Operating while impaired is a very serious issue. In 2021, we had 102 arrests for operating while impaired. The legal limit in Wisconsin is .08%.

In 2021, the average alcohol level at the time of arrest was .18%, which is over double the legal limit. 42% are repeat offenders.

OWI By Offense



Field Sobriety Tests are groups of three tests used by police to determine if a driver is impaired. The tasks assess balance, coordination, and the ability of the driver to divide their attention to more than one task during the field sobriety test.

The tests have been scientifically proven to validate legal intoxication in drivers suspected of impaired driving in 90% of cases if administered by a trained officer. Results of the test are admissible as evidence in court.

DRUGS/NARCOTICS

The nation has seen a rise in drug use and that is no different for Chippewa Falls. In the past 5 years, we have seen a huge increase in methamphetamine and heroin use.

DRUGS/NARCOTICS

CFPD works with Chippewa County Recovery Court to get the proper resources to the people who struggle with drug offenses/addictions in hopes to curb repeat offenses.

Chippewa County Recovery Court is a treatment-based alternative to jail, prison, and the standard probation model. The justice system works with the Department of Human Services, treatment agencies, and other rehab services to provide each participant with all the possible tools needed to get into recovery, stay in recovery, and lead a productive, crime-free life.

The key components of the Chippewa County Recovery Court Program include:

- **Immediate intervention.** The sooner a person is placed in treatment following a crisis, the more successful the outcome. In Recovery Court, an individual can move from referral or other court action to Recovery Court and treatment in as little as two weeks. More common adjudication processes typically take several months.
- **Voluntary entry.** Participants who decide to enter and voluntarily commit to a program are more likely to succeed.
- **Sanctions and rewards.** Participant accountability is an important piece to recovery and continues success. Incentives for participants include fewer urine tests (UA) or court appearances, gift certificates, recognition of success, graduation to the next phase of the program, and much more. A system of graduated sanctions may include reduced privileges, community service, and increased UA tests.
- **Rule of 20/30/40.** Participants are expected to demonstrate 20/30/40 hours of productive activity each week, depending on what Phase they are in. A form which appears similar to a time card is provided each week to the participants. The participants need to fill the form out explaining how they spend their days. It is expected that each participant attends 1/2/3 recovery meetings a week, meets with a sponsor or mentor weekly, is completing volunteer services and/or is employed, or attending school.
- **Program Phases.** The Recovery Court Program is divided into five phases in order to provide short-term goals for the participants to meet. Short-term goals are developed for individuals to have a better chance of success. Participants meet regularly with the Recovery Court judge to review their progress and address positive/negative behaviors. As the participant successfully completes a phase, he/she is rewarded by continuing in a less intensive program.
- **Graduation.** The graduation portion of the Recovery Court is the final phase of the program, designating the end of the intensive program and the beginning of the continuing care phase.
- **Continuing Care.** The continuing care phase is designed for the participant to continue with their recovery with continued contact with the Recovery Court team.

CITIZEN MERITORIOUS AWARDS

July 9, 2021

Last week we awarded three Citizen Meritorious Awards for helping to save a person in our community. Mr. Travis Raske, Mr. Alex Ische and Mr. Daniel Schmidt were in a boat fishing at night earlier this year above the dam on the Chippewa River. They were just making their final pass before heading to the dock when they heard what they thought was a cough. They began searching the area. Through the dark and misty conditions to their shock they found a fully clothed person floating silently and making no movements in the middle of the river. They shouted to the person and threw a rope, but received almost no response. Working together they were able to rescue the person from the river and bring them to shore. Police and EMS were contacted who provided medical help and a mental health assessment as the person appeared to be in mental crisis. When receiving their award from the Chief all three of these men reported they would never forget this experience on the river and they were happy to be in the right place at the right time to help. If not for the quick thinking and selfless actions of these three individuals, there was a high probability that this person would not have survived their encounter with the Chippewa River.



July 28, 2021

Today we awarded Mr. Alex Conrad with a Citizen Meritorious Award for helping save a life. Earlier this year Alex was driving across the Main St bridge at night when he passed someone standing by the railing. He thought something just didn't feel right so he turned around and went back. When he returned he saw the person had a rope tied around their neck. He parked his car diagonally on the bridge so that it would draw attention. He was able to walk up to the person. He held on to them so they couldn't jump and talked to them to keep them calm until the police arrived. Once police arrived the officers were able to cut the rope and pull the person away from the railing to safety. They were taken to a mental health hospital to get help. Alex's quick thinking, compassion and initiative that day surely saved the life of a person in mental crisis. Thank you!

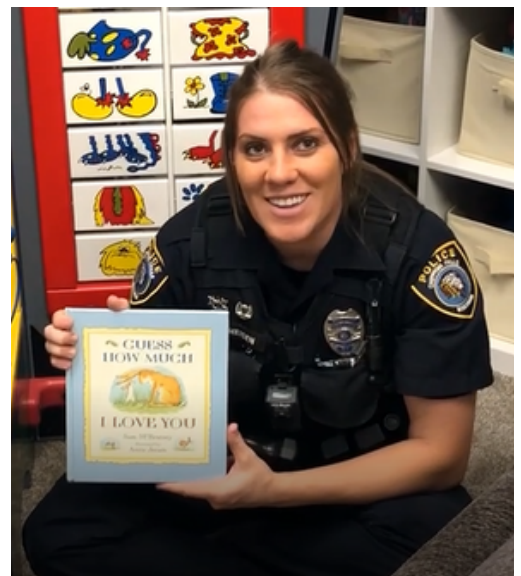
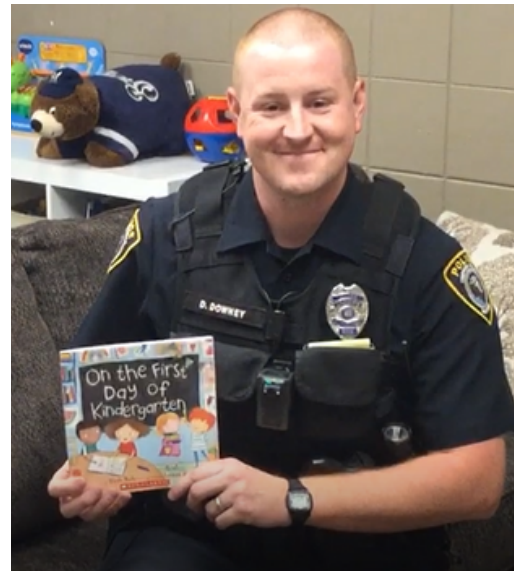


COPS WITH KIDS

2021 was also the second year for Operation Bedtime Story.







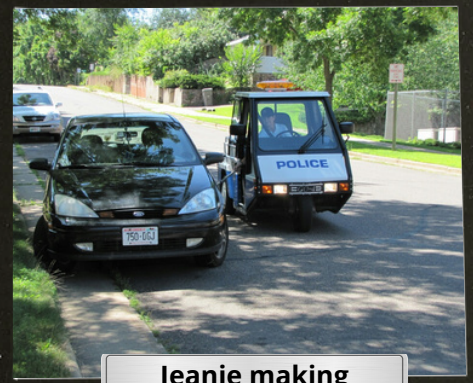

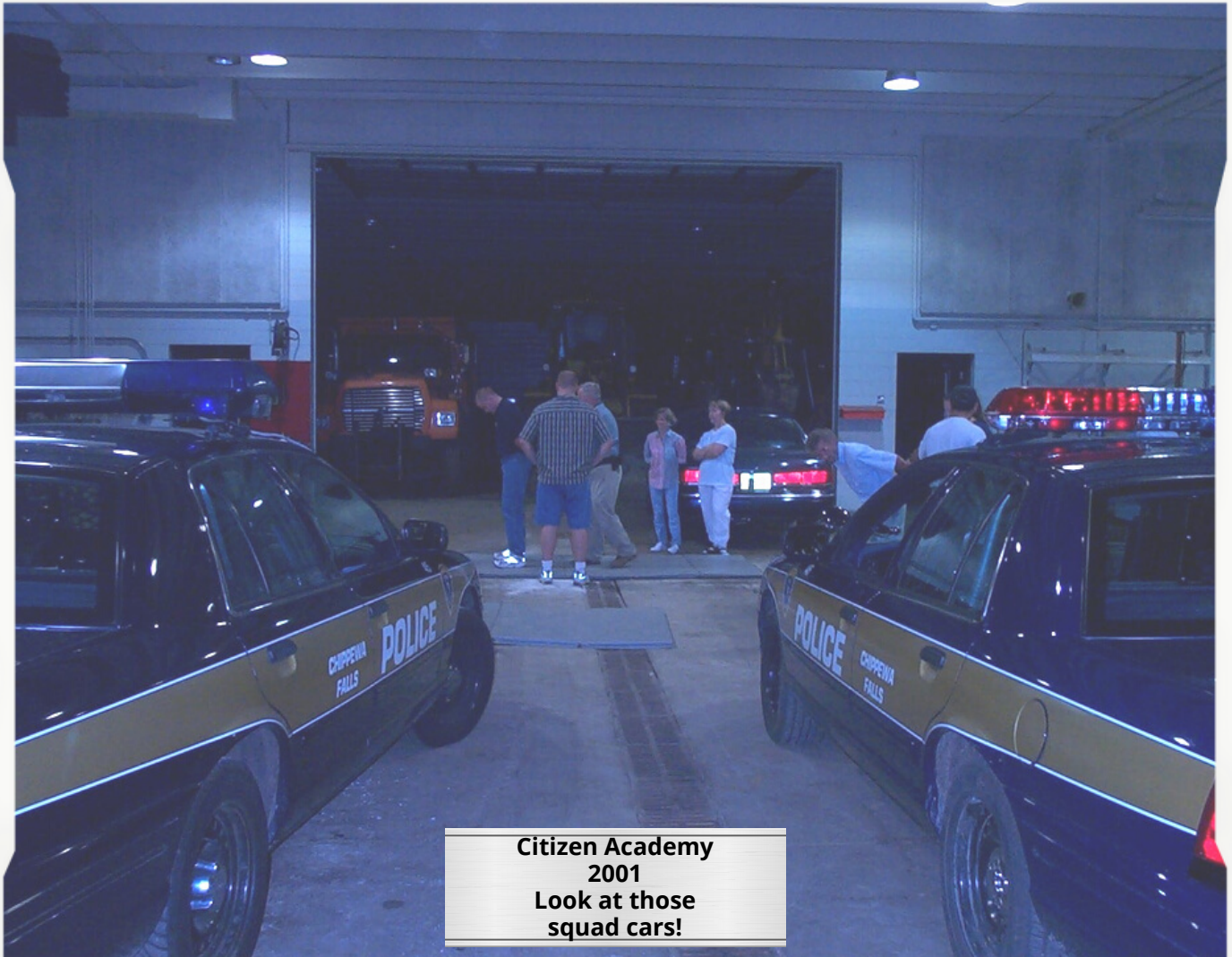

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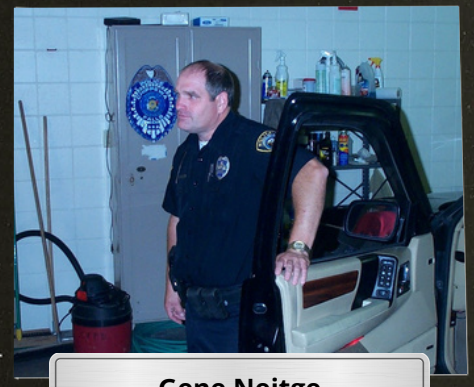
